#### New Hulu Series Hits Close to Home

As a teenager in the early 70s, I was trying to figure out my life like any other young girl does. All I knew during my middle and high school years was that I loved science and math and wanted to study these topics. Being the oldest of seven kids, I always joke that my parents were too busy to tell me that girls shouldn't like math or that I should think about marriage instead of my education. I did end up getting married and having a family (I'm a grandmother now!) but also completed my education and have had multiple professional careers over the years.

One influential figure during my teen years was the political activist Phyllis Schlafly from Alton, IL, not far from where I grew up. Schlafly mobilized groups of housewives from throughout the US to fight against the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). At the time, there was support from both sides of the aisle for the amendment, but her efforts stopped it in its tracks.

At the time, I don't think I realized that Phyllis lived just an hour away from my home, but I did hear about her. It was difficult for me to understand how someone who was educated and led a powerful organization could also promote the message that women should be dependent on men. I listened for about a minute and then moved on.

Just this month, Hulu started a new series called "Mrs. America" that tells her story and the other women involved on the other side of the feminist movement at the time like Shirley Chisolm. Shirley was the first black women elected to the US congress and she ran for president in 1972. Another character in the series was also from Illinois, Betty Friedan. Betty is considered the mother of the women's movement due to her 1963 book "The Feminine Mystique."

I've been enjoying the series so far, and it's especially interesting to me since much of it happened right down the road from where I grew up.
